

Course overview

The Bachelor of Community Services is a fully accredited Higher Education degree. The course is designed to prepare you for ethical, competent, and culturally relevant community service practice and to equip you with the knowledge and skills you need for life-long learning and professional development. Upon completion, you will work at the interface between people and their environments, focusing on the experiences of individuals, families, groups, and communities. Some areas of service provision may include child and family services, juvenile justice, migrant services, and community development.

Course structure

To be eligible for the Bachelor of Community Services, you are required to acquire 24 units (360 credit points) as prescribed in Units on page 2.

Requirements

International students

Completed Year 12 or equivalent. The minimum age is 18 years old. International students must also demonstrate that they have English language ability equivalent to IELTS 6.0 (Academic). For further information, please refer to our Higher Education Student Admission Policy on our website.
